## Cultural Narratives Handover



# Our kura runs a KICKSTART BREAKFAST PROGRAMME

What it is:

The KickStart Breakfast programme is a partnership between **Fonterra**, **Sanitarium**, and the **New Zealand Government**. It provides **free nutritious breakfasts** (Weet-Bix and Anchor milk) to students in schools throughout Aotearoa New Zealand.

#### **©**Purpose

The aim is to ensure all tamariki start their school day **fed, focused, and ready to learn**. It supports schools and kura to:

- Improve student wellbeing and concentration.
- Encourage positive relationships and a sense of community.
- Provide a consistent, inclusive start to the school day.

#### A How it works

- Schools sign up to join the programme (any decile/Equity Index school can apply).
- Fonterra supplies Anchor milk, and Sanitarium provides Weet-Bix for free.
- The school provides the setup e.g., bowls, spoons, tables, and supervision.
- Breakfast can be served daily or a few times a week, depending on need and volunteers.

#### **75** Who can participate

- The programme is **open to all students** it's not limited to those in need. (This helps remove stigma and encourages inclusiveness.)
- Some schools run it for the whole school: others make it available to those who want it.

#### **Benefits**

- Better concentration and participation in morning learning.
- Improved attendance and punctuality.
- Strengthened relationships between students, staff,
   Opportunities for tuakana–teina (older students helping younger ones).

#### Who does the check?

A specially trained pharmacist will do the check. They can answer any questions you have at any time.

#### How long does the check take?

The sore throat check only takes a few minutes and the pharmacist will let you know if any treatment or follow-up with a doctor is needed.

#### What happens during the check?

The test is done in a private area at the pharmacy. The pharmacist will gently take a swab of the sore throat using a soft cotton swab. They will lightly brush over the back of the throat, around the tonsils, and over any red or sore areas to collect a sample.

#### Does the test hurt?

The test may be a little uncomfortable and the swabbing may briefly cause slight pain.

#### What happens with the swab sample?

The sample goes to the laboratory to be tested to see if the sore throat is Streptococcus, commonly known as strep throat

The pharmacist will get in touch with you 3 or 4 working days after the test to let you know the results and to discuss next steps and

#### What if medicine is needed? Do I need to go to the doctor?

In some cases, antibiotics are needed to treat the infection. If you need antibiotics after your throat check, the pharmacist will supply them to you. There will be no cost for the antibiotics.

#### Curriculum Changes and End-of-Year Reporting

This year has brought several updates to the New Zealand Curriculum, and our kaiako have worked incredibly hard to navigate these changes and weave them meaningfully into our teaching programmes. As a result, you may notice some shifts reflected in your child's end-of-year report.

Our End of Year reports may look a little different to what you have seen previously as we continue to adjust to evolving Ministry and government requirements.

All key information explaining these changes is included in the reports themselves, so we encourage you to take the time to read them carefully, and to look at the Parent Portal (link above).

More curriculum changes are on the horizon for 2026, and we expect further adjustments to follow. Despite the uncertainty across the education sector, we remain extremely proud of how well our kaiako and  $\bar{a}$ konga continue to adapt. Their resilience, teamwork, and commitment ensure that Portland School — Te Kura o Tikorangi remains a place where great learning happens every day.

As always, any of our kaiako are available to speak to your child's report, explain changes or for a general korero about your child and their learning.

FREE checks for eligible people aged 3 - 35 years at participating pharmacies until 30 June 2026.

#### What is a sore throat check?

It is a swab test of the throat to see if the Streptococcus bacteria is causing the sore throat, sometimes called strep throat.

#### Why is it important to get a sore throat checked?

Flu and cold viruses can also cause sore throats, so the swab test tells you when strep throat is the

If you are at a higher risk of developing rheumatic fever, you must check a sore throat early and get treatment for strep throat with antibiotics. Without treatment, strep throat can cause rheumatic fever, which can damage your heart.

You are at higher risk of rheumatic fever if:

- you have had rheumatic fever before
- someone in your family or household has had rheumatic fever
- you are of Māori or Pacific Peoples ethnicity.

If you are not at higher risk, rheumatic fever is extremely unlikely for you, even if you have strep throat, so you don't need a swab test.

If you feel very unwell, have a high fever, or just have questions, seek advice from your doctor or Healthline phone 0800 611 116, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

#### How much does the check cost?

For a limited time, the sore throat check is FREE at participating pharmacies.

#### How long is the FREE sore throat check available?

Now until 30 June 2026.

#### Who can get a FREE sore throat check?

People aged 3 to 35 years old who are at high risk of rheumatic fever are eligible for a FREE check.

People who are outside of this group can still get a sore throat check at their local hauora Māori provider, Pacific health clinic or doctors. Charges may apply.

## Do we need to book for a FREE sore throat

No, just head to one of the pharmacies and ask for a check.

As part of the **Numeracy Curriculum changes** and ongoing **Kaimahi Professional Development and Planning for 2026**,

we will be holding two staff-only days at the end of Term 4:

- → Monday, 15 December 2025
- → Tuesday, 16 December 2025

School will be closed for ALL students on these days

While we understand that staff-only days may cause some inconvenience for our whānau, it is essential that our Kaiako continue to develop their teaching practices to provide the best possible learning programmes for your tamariki.

These dates have been carefully chosen to minimise disruption to the school year and your child's learning.

Consequently, the **last day of kura for our ākonga in 2025** will now be: Friday, 12 December 2025 – full school day, finishing at 3:00 PM.

We greatly appreciate your understanding and continued support for our kura as we ensure our staff are prepared to deliver high-quality learning experiences in 2026.

# **Property Work**

We are super excited to announce that three major property projects are about to get underway at Te Kura o Tikorangi! These projects include repairing and replacing our drainage, updating classroom window joinery, refreshing sink areas, fixing roofing, repairing cladding, building decks, and completing other essential maintenance. In addition, our entire administration block will receive a full refurbishment.

This is a significant infrastructure upgrade that will benefit our kura for years to come, and we will need the support and understanding of our whānau and community while the work is happening. For everyone's safety, the school gates will be locked over the holiday period from Monday, 22 December to Sunday, 11 January. Please note that access to the kura will be limited during this time.

During the refurbishment of the administration block in Term 1 2026, our office will be temporarily relocated to the small space next to Whānau Tikorangi. Please also note that we will not have a sick bay or shower facilities onsite, so whānau will need to pick up tamariki if they are unwell or require a shower while construction is underway.

Once all the work is complete, the kura will also be receiving a full repaint. By the middle of next year, our kura will be looking refreshed and amazing—ready for another fantastic year of learning and growth!
