Pānui - WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW...

Portland School Te Kura o Tikorangi Out of Zone Enrolments 2025

The Portland School Te Kura o Tikorangi Board of Trustees has determined that there will be four enrolment periods for out of zone students in 2025 coinciding with each school term.

The deadlines for receiving out of zone applications for each school term will be:

- October 29, 2024 for Term 1, 2025
- March 14, 2025 for Term 2
- June 6, 2025 for Term 3
- August 22, 2025 for Term 4
- October 8 2025 for Term 1, 2026

Prior to these deadlines the Board of Trustees will determine and publish the number of places (if any) that are available at various class levels for out of zone students.

Current out of zone places available:


There are currently 10 out of zone places available at Portland School Te Kura o Tikorangi for Term 1, 2026

Applications for enrolments will be processed in the following order of priority:

- 1. This priority is not applicable at this school, because the school does not run a special programme approved by the Secretary for Education
- 2. Siblings of current students
- 3. Siblings of former students
- 4. Children of former students
- 5. Children of Board employees
- 6. All other applicants

If there are more applicants in the second, third, fourth, fifth or sixth priority groups than there are places available, selection within the priority group must be by ballot conducted in accordance with instructions issued by the Secretary under Section 11G(1) of the Education Act 1989. Parents will be informed of the date of any ballot by notice in a daily or community newsletter circulating in the area served by the school. Applicants seeking second or third priority status will be required to give proof of a sibling relationship.

Creating a Bilingual Space at Portland School — Te Kura o Tikorangi

Over the past 3 terms, we have been on an exciting journey exploring the creation of a bilingual space at Portland School — Te Kura o Tikorangi in response to numerous whanau requests.

Our mahi began with research and visits to all the kura in Whang \bar{a} rei who already have bilingual settings. From these visits, we gained invaluable insights into structure, progressions, achievement, and outcomes. It was an enlightening, inspiring, and encouraging process that showed us this pathway is not only possible, but also achievable for our amazing kura.

Alongside this, we engaged in robust consultation with our community. We held hui, shared surveys, and had open korero with whanau, kaiako, students, and community members. The turnout was fantastic, and the overwhelming support, positivity, and encouragement confirmed for us that this is the right direction for our kura and its incredible akonga.

We also connected with the Ministry of Education, who have been nothing but supportive, providing guidance for our next steps. One of the most validating discoveries was realising that through our current structure, we are already operating at a Level 3 bilingual standard – between 30 and 50% of our learning each week through a Te Ao Māori lens. This makes the transition a natural and easy progression with no major changes and, building on the amazing mahi we already do while holding fast to the priorities our whānau value most.

Moving forward, we will continue our strong current focus on Structured Literacy and Mathematics, while further increasing the use of Te Reo Māori across the kura. Our local curriculum will continue to drive inquiry and learning, ensuring we honour Te Tiriti o Waitangi and provide the very best education for our tamariki.

Looking forward to 2026 - we have wonderful kaiako and kaimahi who have all started upskilling their reo, an have all committed to continue to increase their use of te Reo $M\bar{a}$ ori throughout the kura, and more within certain classroom spaces.

We want to thank you all for your involvement, support and encouragement in making this kaupapa an achievable reality for our kura.



Once you've signed up, you will be part of general communication, as well as subscribe yourself to your child/ren's class, so you'll receive any pānui sent specifically to that class.




Ngā mihi nui to our Portland Minis Netball Team on a fantastic season!










Matakohe's Something Fishy Writing






Something Fishy


